•	l imitate and respond to babies' jabbering, pointing, and verbal and nonverbal attempts at communication.				
•	I model words and how to say things that babies are trying to communicate.				
•	I read storybooks to babies.				
•	I am patient, I stop and ask questions, and I wait for babies to talk about the stories we are reading.				
•	I model words and phrases for babies to learn and imitate.				
18-24 Months					
•	I read longer stories as toddlers get older and their attention spans increase.				
•	l ask toddlers questions while reading books to engage them with the story.				
•	I start and engage in conversations with toddlers about things they are doing, things that happen, or objects they find interesting.				
Two-Year-Olds					
•	l answer toddlers' questions and explain things to them.				
	I make eye contact and listen when toddlers are talking with me.				
•	l engage in conversations with and describe things to toddlers.				
•	I read storybooks about things that toddlers find interesting.
