•	I provide mobile babies with time and space for movement, exploration, and play.			
	I encourage and show babies how to express interest in other babies.			
•	I stay near babies and verbally describe what they are doing, what they are trying to do, what their interests are, and what they discover.			
•	I scaffold activities to extend babies' interest, discoveries, and learning.			
18	-24 Months			
	I provide predictable routines to help toddlers anticipate daily events.			
•	I provide interesting toys and materials in places toddlers can access on their own.			
•	I scaffold learning opportunities and ask toddlers open-ended questions.			
•	I read books to toddlers.			
•	I ask toddlers questions about stories and give them time to think and respond.

•	I model patience, problem solving, and words for feelings.			
	I encourage and help toddlers solve their own problems.			
	I encourage and support toddlers doing things by themselves.			
	I encourage and support toddlers' interactions.			
	I verbally describe toddlers' thinking, behaviors, and interactions.			
•	I verbally describe objects, events, and people's feelings.			
•	I verbally count things, name colors, name shapes, and talk about time.
